MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PUEBLO CONSERVANCY DISTRICT

March 8, 1935

A meeting of the Board of Directors of The Pueblo Conservancy District was held in the office of the District at 2 P.M. March 8, 1935

The meeting was called to order by John M. Holmes president of the District. Directors present: Holmes; Mathis and Pryor

The minutes of the meeting of January 15, 1935 were read, and upon motion, approved.

Report of J. G. Harvey on number of lots south of the Santa Fe Avenue bridge shows four portions of lots beyond the street which runs parallel to the river at that point. It was moved by Mr. Mathis and seconded by Mr. Pryor that the District give deed to John Petta for Lots 22 and 28 in Block 11, and portions of Lots 27, 28, 29 and 30 in Block 21, both blocks in Stanton & Snyder's Sub. of City of Pueblo. The price of these portions of lots to be \$150.00 for all.

Tom Kato wished to again lease the land called the "John Felix" place for \$225.00 beginning with March 1, and motion was made by Mr. Pryor, seconded by Mr. Mathis that a lease be given him for a year at that figure. Motion carried unanimously.

The attached letter from Mr. Holmes was read, and after discussion it was moved by Mr. Mathis that a refund of \$3.02 be made Mrs. Savant as it was thought this amount was collected due to no fault of Mrs. Savant. Mr. Pryor seconded the motion, the vote being unanimous in favor of same.

Motion was made by Mr. Pryor that the Board of Directors ratify action taken by President John M. Holmes in accepting \$99.00 from James Cowen for Robt. U. "appy in full settlement of Tax Certificates 59821; 61610; 64770; 70869; 75231 and 77995 on February 4, 1935; In accepting \$183.06 from Pueblo Industrial Co.

in full settlement of Tax Certificates 75471 and 78220A on February 13, 1935; In accepting \$536.26 from Tom Downen in full settlement of Tax Certificates 75204; 70850; 75179; 70826; 75180 and 70827 Feb. 16, 1935; In accepting \$578.51 from Midland Savings & Loan Co. in full settlement of Certificates 64710; 64711; 70777; 70778; 75108; 75109; 77873; 77874; February 28, 1935; In accepting \$818.10 from G. L. L. Gann in full settlement of Certificates 70773: 75103 and 77879 March 4, 1935; In accepting \$116.44 from J. F. Hughes in full settlement of Certificates 75018; 70710; 64669; 61542; 59772 and 77794 March 8, 1935;

Motion was seconded by Mr. Mathis, vote being unanimous in favor of same the motion was declared carried.

A letter was read from the Bessemer Irrigating Ditch Company submitting an estimate of cost by the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company of putting in two 48" concrete or corrugated culverts at Mile Post 125 plus 3433 feet.

This will acknowledge receipt of your's of March sixth enclosing copy of letter from the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company dated March 5 which was an estimate on cost of laying two 48" corrugated iron pipes under their tracks at Mile Post 125 plus 3433 feet.

The District assumes the same attitude now that they did in the past, that all of that work up there was a part of the original plan of the Conservancy District; that the work was done. known of and agreed to by all concerned as per our letter of November 4, 1925 to Mr. F. U. Puder, Division Engineer of the D & R G RR. The Board therefore refuses any responsibility in this matter of sluice gate and culvert. However, if it is the desire of the Bessemer Irrigating Ditch Company and the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad Company to hold a meeting with the Directors of the Bonservancy District to further discuss this matter, it will be the pleasure of the Board to meet with you.

Gentlemen:

On the 23rd I had a visit from Mrs. Anna M. Savant, of 423 W. 4th St. Her story is something to this effect — that it has been her habit and custome, since the death of her husband, some year or two ago, to go to the Court House in January and July and pay her taxes; that she has merely asked the clerk that waited upon her for the total amount of her tax bill and she has paid those bills. The correctness of this statement is quite apparently born out by the receipts which she possesses.

However, in July of 1934, when she made her customary visit to the Court House and asked for her bill, she states that a lady waited upon her and made up her tax bill for her. She states that she realized that it was less than it had been and made such remark to the clerk that waited upon her. The clerk replied then by saying that the taxes were somewhat less than they had been.

A few days ago when Mrs. Savant went to the Court House and asked for her tax bill she was very much surprised to find that her taxes were very much more than they were at the July payment and asked why such was the case. She was shown the fact that her Conservancy Tax was not paid in July. Consequently her January installment was added to the bill and her July installment was added to the bill. She was charged penalties, interests, etc. on the installment which she should have paid last July and which she would have willingly paid had it been given to her. From what Mrs. Savant says she was not treated with any great amount of courtesy by the clerk that waited upon her a few days ago.

The Redemption Certificate given to her covering her delinquent payment on the Conservancy Tax is #41169. The delinquent tax as paid for July and the payment of January are listed belows

I believe that a refund of this amount should be made to the woman for I am firmly convinced that in no way is it any fault of hers that she did not pay the bill in July and she should not be made to suffer for the errors and the inefficiency of some clerk that waited upon her.

I respectfully request, Mrs. Cross, that you check this over and advise the Board of Directors at their next meeting just what can be done along this line.
